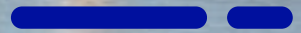

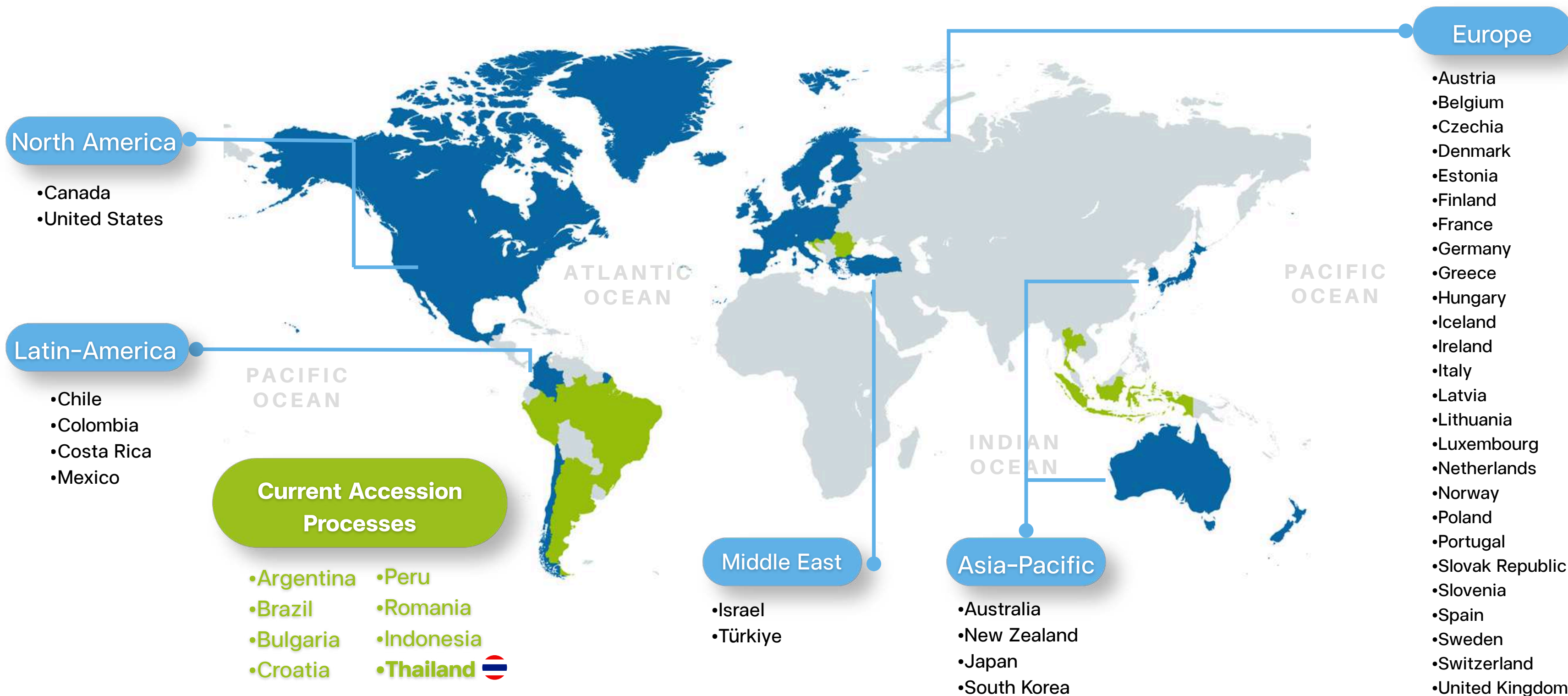

The Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) is an international organization that plays a key role in providing research, consultation, the exchange of best practices, and policy recommendations aimed at promoting stability, equality, well-being, and an improved quality of life – in line with its vision of **“Better Policies for Better Lives.”**

Founded in 1961 - Member Countries: Currently, OECD has 38 member countries and 8 countries in the Accession Process or Accession Candidate Countries



Forum for Exchanging Information

Promoting cooperation to address global economic issues by providing a forum for exchanging information and policy experiences

Statistical Data

Collecting and disseminating important statistical data, publishing knowledge across various fields annually and, maintaining over 40 global and country-specific economic databases

Source of Knowledge

Serving as a source of knowledge and disseminating in-depth country information through experts in both theory and practice

Global Standards Setting

Establishing global standards across various fields that are crucial for national development by defining instruments or documents that promote global economic expansion and cooperation

Advisory Services

Providing advice to government agencies across various countries and offering research services to other international organisations such as the UN and the IMF

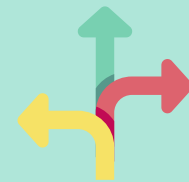


Role of OECD?

The Council is the OECD's decision-making body, composed of one representative from each Member Country as well as from the European Union. Chaired by the Secretary-General, it provides the strategic direction for the Organisation and its work through consensus-based decision-making.

The Committees are composed of more than 300 substantive bodies, working to propose solutions, develop standards, assess data and policy successes, and review policy actions. Policy specialists drawn from various institutions play a role in establishing shared global standards across public policy domains.

The Secretariat



The Secretariat is composed of more than 3,500 employees from across multiple directorates and is led by the Secretary-General. It carries out the work of the OECD to provide insights and expertise to help guide evidence-based policymaking in close co-ordination with Members.

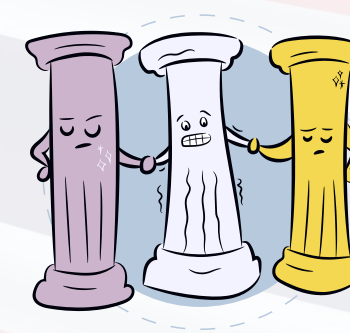

2024

16 April 2024
Letter of Intent

Thailand submitted a Letter of Intent to join the OECD.



17 June 2024
Accession Discussions

OECD unanimously reached a consensus to formally open accession discussions with Thailand.



10 July 2024
Accession Roadmap

OECD Council adopted Thailand's Accession Roadmap.



30 October 2024
Accession Kick-off

OECD Secretary-General paid a visit to Thailand and formally delivered Thailand's Accession Roadmap.



2025

10 March 2025
The Prime Minister chaired the first meeting of the committee overseeing Thailand's accession to the OECD

8 July 2025
The Cabinet passed a resolution approving the results of the initial meeting which mandated 34 government agencies to work with 25 OECD committees



8 December 2025
The Prime Minister submitted Thailand's Initial Memorandum (IM) to OECD Deputy Secretary-General

IM is a document for assessing Thailand's readiness to align its laws, policies, and practices with OECD standards and legal instruments.

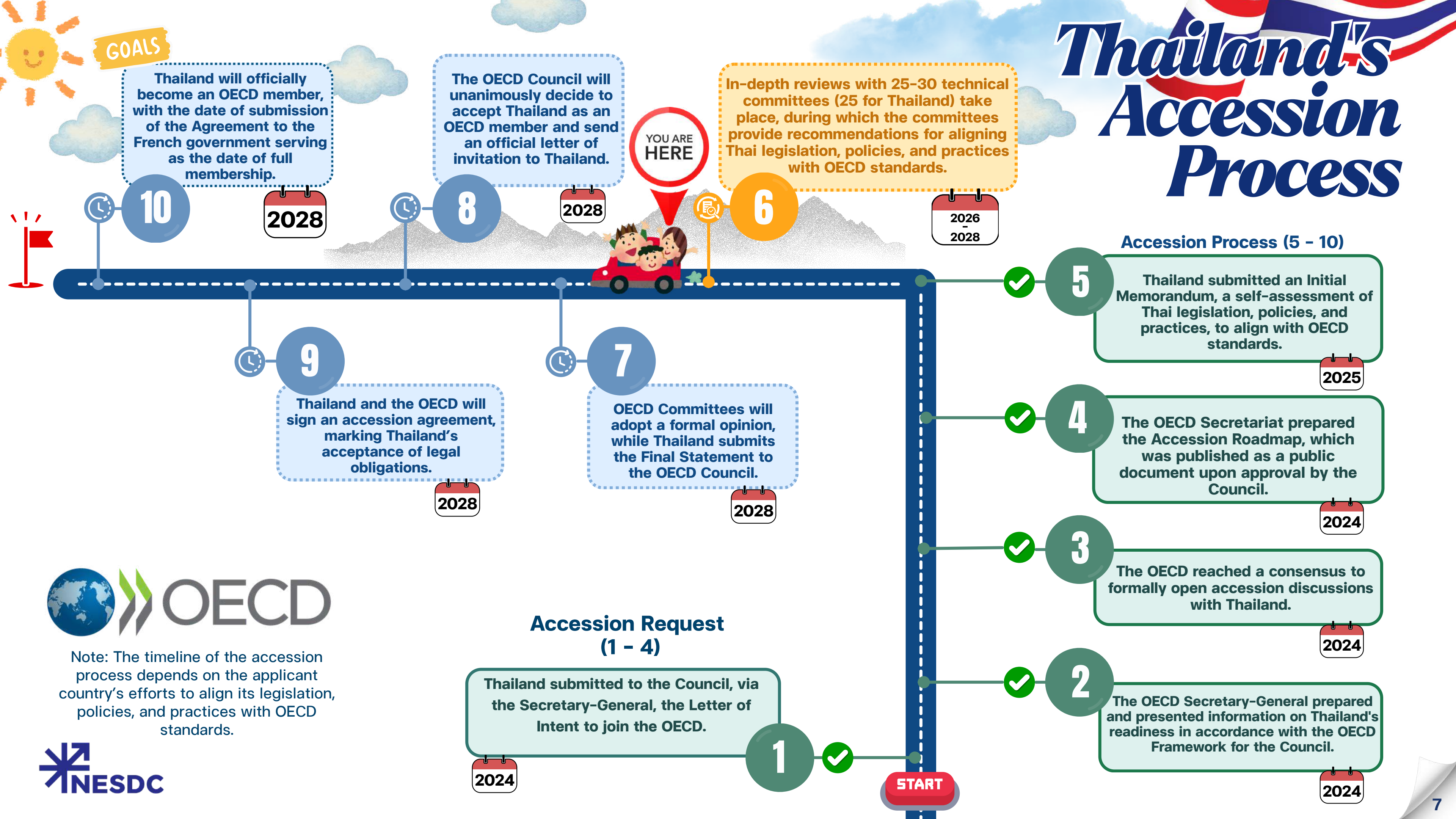


2026

19 May 2026
The Cabinet approved the the nation's target OECD accession date of 2028 and the formation of the OECD Supervisory Committee and assigned the NESDC, OCS, and MFA to oversee the accession process

7 July 2026
The Draft Regulations of the Office of the Prime Minister on the Committee... was approved in principle by the Cabinet

Public Sector



Multi-dimensional structural reforms encompassing good governance, transparency, fair competition, and comprehensive taxation

Adoption of OECD members' best practices adapted to Thailand's context

Regular evaluations and closer collaboration with the OECD, enhancing national standards and officials' capacity

Time required to align laws and policies with OECD standards

Heavier workload and higher resource needs (e.g., membership fees, travel, skilled personnel)

Possible loss of tax and non-tax privileges for developing countries

Private Sector



Adoption of responsible business conduct (RBC) standards, enhancing competitiveness in global markets

Greater ease for Thai investors to undertake outward foreign direct investment (FDI), particularly in OECD member countries

Short-term capital movements (e.g., financial market investments, lending), potentially increasing exchange rate volatility

Inflows of FDI potentially intensifying competition for Thai businesses in targeted sectors such as intra-group lending, representative offices, construction, engineering services, and retail/wholesale trade

Civil Society



Access to Thailand's assessment data on various areas, enabling public oversight of government actions and performance

Improved quality of life through internationally aligned standards, providing better opportunities in education, living conditions, and income, supported by a stronger economy and increased foreign investment

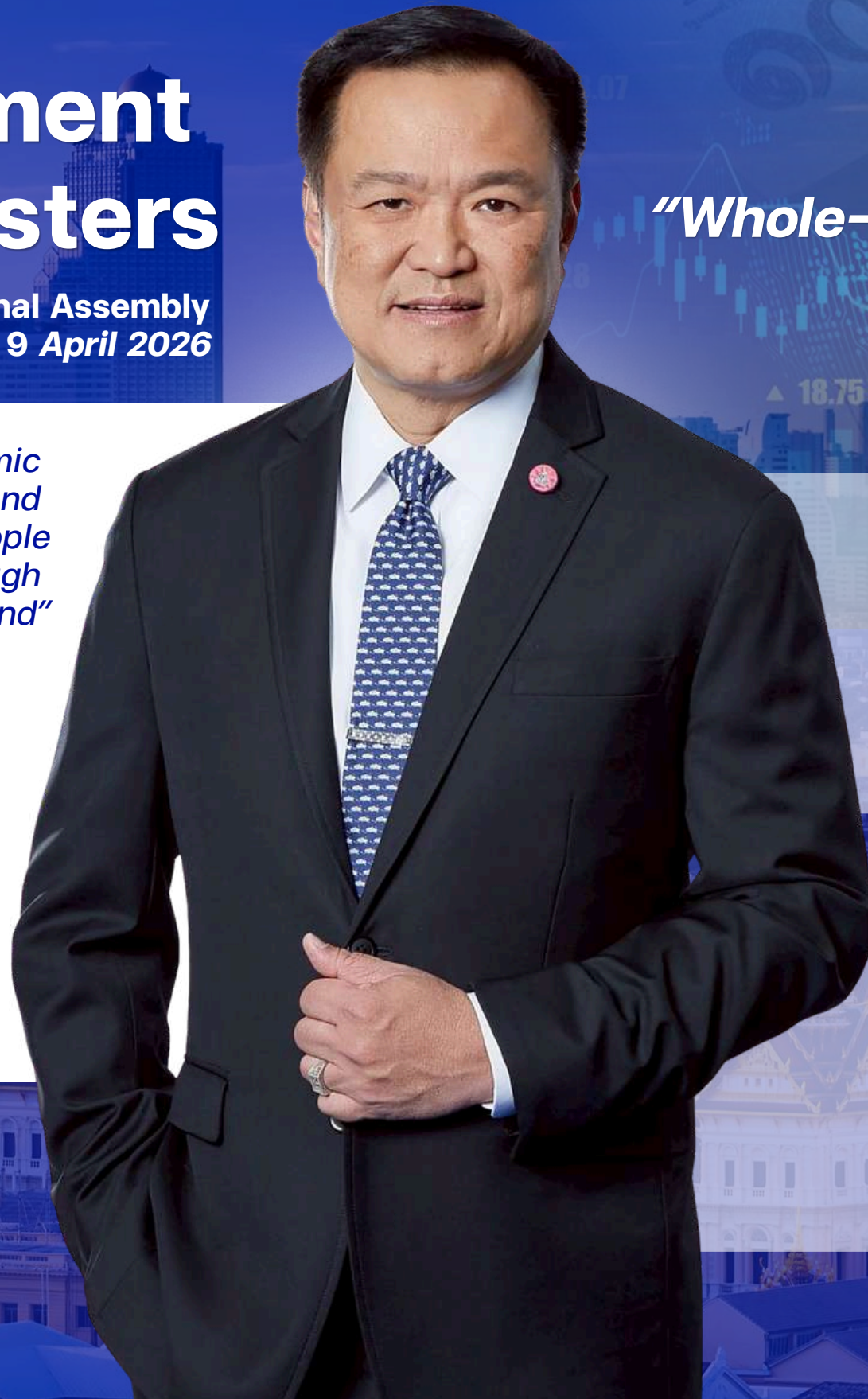

- Supports the committee's discussion

- The Secretariat presents the report
- Thailand presents its legislation, policies and practices in the policy area, followed by a Q&A session with Members
- Members discuss in closed session the report and proposed recommendations

- The recommendations agreed by the Committee are communicated through a letter from the Chair of the Committee
- Once the country has addressed the recommendations, it sends a letter of response to the Chair's letter.

Next Steps after the Technical Review



Step 7

H1/2028



Formal Opinion

Once all subsidiary bodies have completed their reviews, the relevant Committees can adopt their Formal Opinion. This will occur on a committee-by-committee basis rather than all at once when all Committees have concluded.



Step 8

H2/2028



Council Decision

The OECD Council will decide by unanimity whether to invite the country to become a **member based on all the formal committee** opinions. The Secretary-General then reports on the process and other relevant documentation.



Step 9

H2/2028



Accession Agreement

If the Council's decision is positive, the Accession Agreement will be signed between the country and the OECD.



Step 10

H2/2028



Membership

After completion of domestic procedures, the country will formally accede to the OECD Convention by depositing its instrument of accession and will become an OECD member as of that date.

Accession involves an **in-depth 360° dialogue and analysis between Thailand and the 25 technical committees** covering almost every area of government policy

OECD accession has proven to be a **transformative process and a catalyst for reform**, providing powerful leverage for the adoption of major legislative and policy changes

The accession process of each country is independent, and the **domestic context and priorities of each country are considered** in the discussions

There is **no timetable or set end-date for accession**: it depends on the country's pace in providing information and responding to recommendations

Scope of assessment

Throughout the OECD accession process, two key principles are emphasized by the OECD:



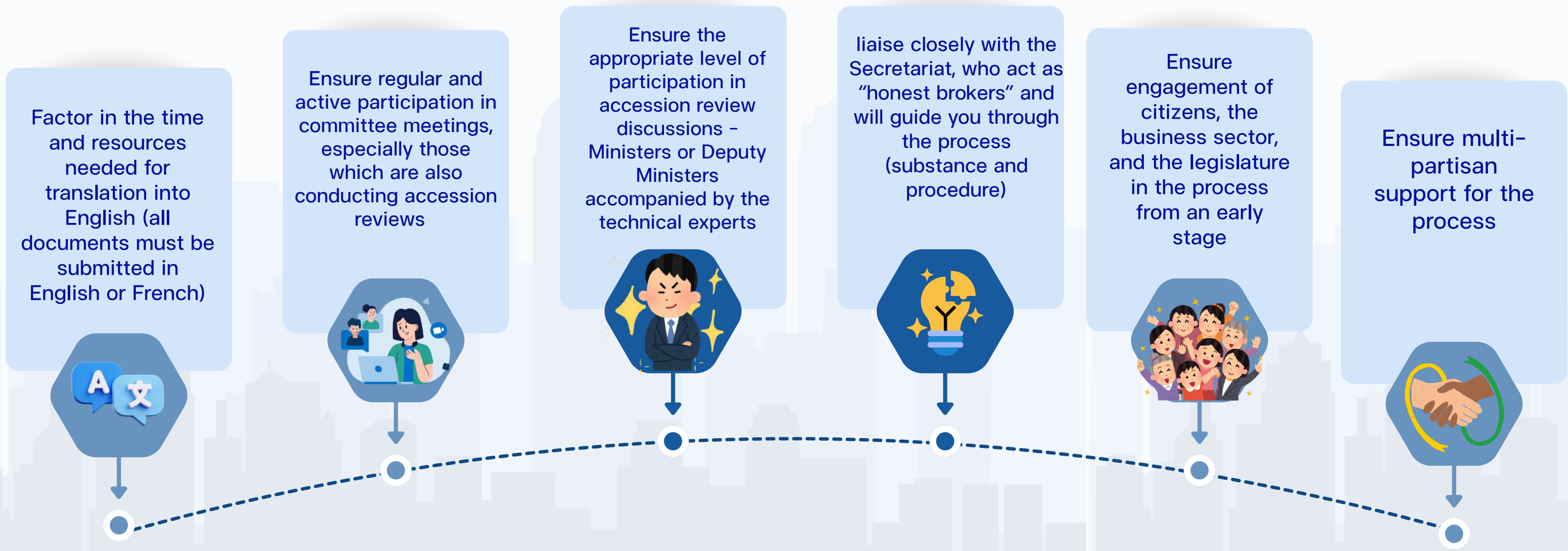
Assessment of Thailand's willingness and ability to implement OECD Legal Instruments

Evaluation of Thailand's policies and practices in comparison with OECD standards and best policies and practices



The assessment will be completed only when Thailand's progress on both of the above issues is considered **satisfactory by the committees**. The committees will then proceed to formulate their conclusions as a formal opinion.

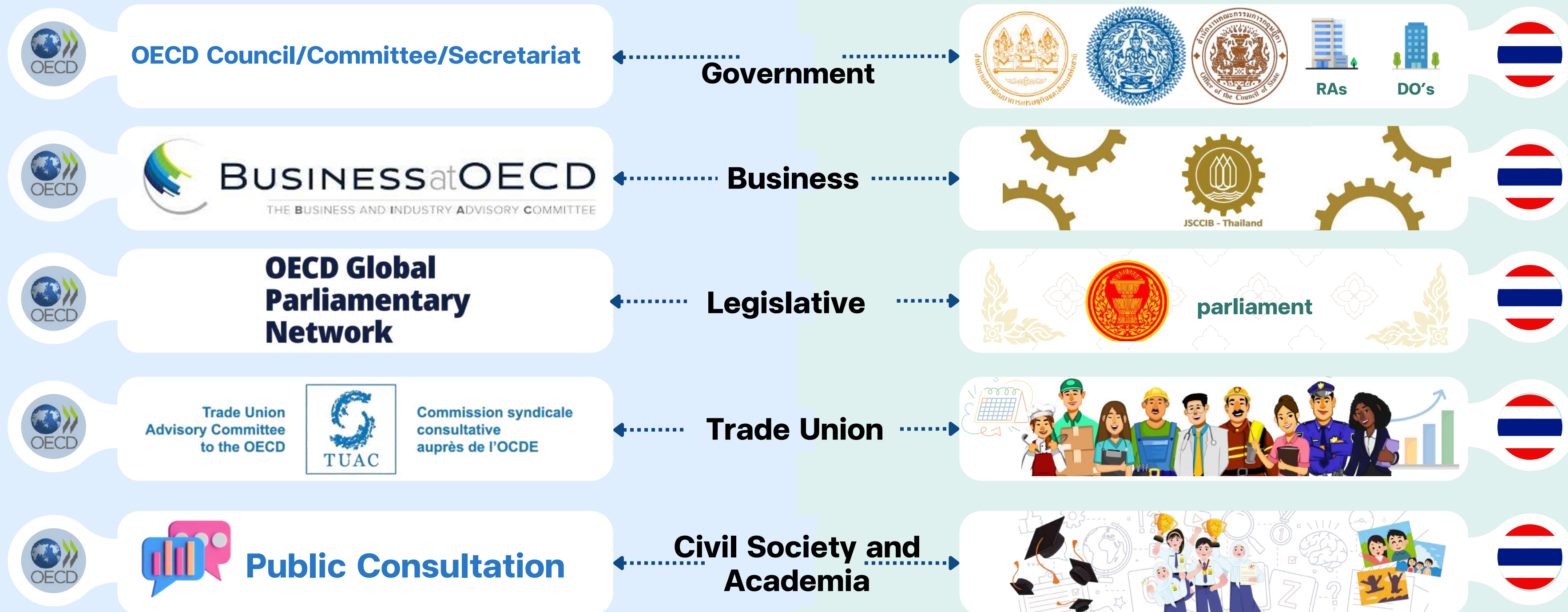

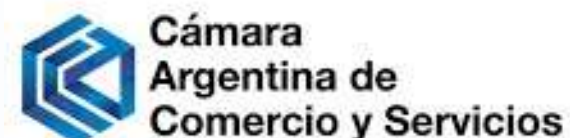
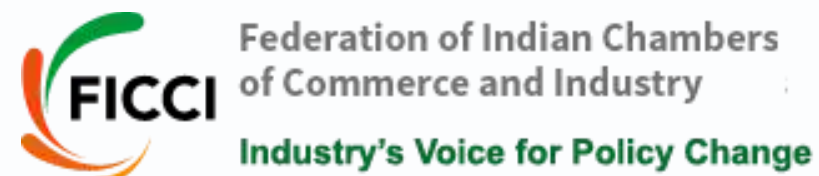

GPN Role

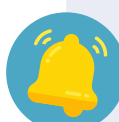
Opens global network for legislative knowledge exchange among parliamentarians and parliamentary officials from worldwide



Enhances public policy through knowledge exchange and promoting the practical application of international standards



Helps the parliament understand key issues such as the economy, governance, transparency, and sustainable development



Connects the parliament with experts and international networks



Grants members access to OECD analysis and recommendations, and allows them to exchange perspectives with international experts and representatives



GPN

Role of the Thai Parliament



Plays a key role in cooperating with the executive, driving the OECD accession process



Promotes legislation aligned with OECD standards on transparency, governance, and the protection of citizens' rights



Ensures institutional continuity, enabling reforms to progress despite changes in government.



Reflects citizens' voices in the law reform process through public hearings and digital engagement tools.



Establishes the **Advisory Council of the Parliament of Thailand on the Accession of Thailand to the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (ACP-OECD)** as a central platform to drive legal reforms and strengthen cooperation with the OECD and GPN, both domestically and internationally.

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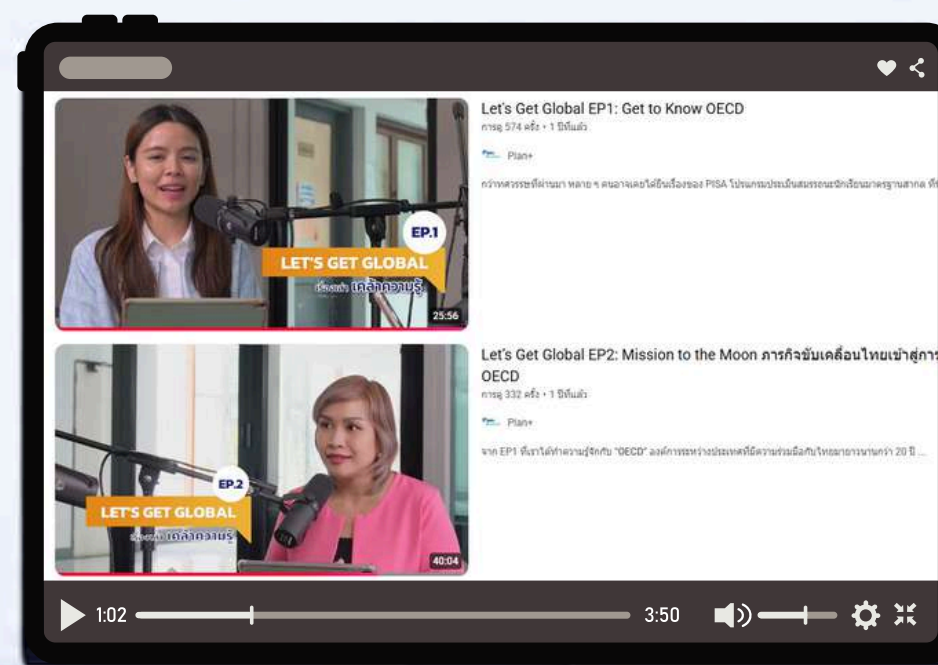
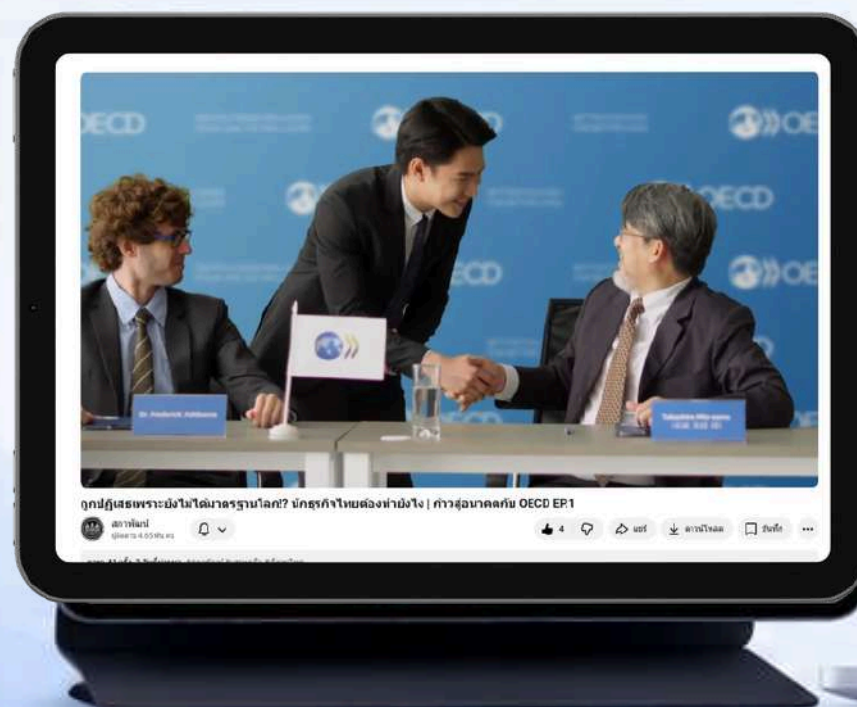
